#### **BACKGROUND**:

In response to COVID-19, both the federal government and the State of California have passed relief bills to support the public throughout the pandemic. In each bill, public schools have been allocated resources with specific permissible uses. The first wave of resources, which included Learning Loss Mitigation Funds from the state, CARES Act/ESSER 1 funds from the federal government, were written in the District Learning Continuity Attendance Plan. This plan was approved by the Board on September 23, 2020.

Since the approval of the Learning Continuity and Attendance Plan, the state and federal government has passed three more relief bills: ESSER 2, ESSER 3, and SB 86.

Staff will present a report on the public input process and the proposed allocations for the COVID resources to provide academic and social emotional support for students as well as professional development for staff through the 2023-2024 school year.

Under this cover, there is a spreadsheet, outlining details for each funding source, a table that illustrates the program timeline for the resources, and slides on our proposal development process. Staff has intentionally presented the materials in various formats to support the public's understanding of the resources, permissible uses, and planning.
